EAST FORK BIRDING FESTIVAL KICKOFF



ber. If you can't quite make it that early in the evening, come when you can. We should be easy to find in the picnic grounds before our walk begins. Directions: You have two choices to reach the Picnic Area. You could park in the Sharon Center parking lot and

from the Visitor Center parking lot. There is a public first come first serve picnic shelter on the Visitor Center side of the creek, which we might be able to grab if not already taken. We will be easy to find, just look for the people with binoculars around their necks. Hope to see you there.
